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Thanks to Db Logic S.r.l. **Festival Scope** The 6th edition of the Book Adaptation Rights Market, which will take place within the context of the 78th Venice International Film Festival, confirms the increasing success of this initiative dedicated to publishers, as well as to producers. The Book Adaptation Rights Market will take place both on-site and online for the ones who cannot attend. We are thus welcoming for the first time the publishers and literary agents: Editis (France), Grandi e Associati (Italy) and Tunué (Italy) who will join our faithful publishers and agents from France, Germany, Italy, Norway, Spain, Switzerland, The Netherlands. The following famous films and TV series have been adapted from some of their most successful titles: Patria and Palm Trees in the Snow (Editorial Planeta), The Shape of Water, The Orphanage and Narcisuss and Goldmund (Suhrkamp Verlag), The Book Thief and The Girl on the Train (Sperling & Kupfer - Piemme - Mondadori Ragazzi), Romanzo Criminale and Siberian Education (Giulio Einaudi Editore), Wrinkles and The Lost Thing (Tunué), Mother's Instinct and Time is a Killer (Editis), Gomorra and The Solitude of Prime Numbers (Mondadori Libri), The Shallows of Kabul and Papillon (Robert Laffont). These are just some of the films that have smashed the box office the last ten years. And they're also all taken from successful literary works. In an increasingly digitized and interconnected reality, in fact, stories and ideas are declined in books but also in movies, TV series and video games. The adaptations for the big screen in the era of transmediality and the related copyright are among the topics of these times and some VOD platforms (like Netflix) even dedicate an official section to films adapted from books.

The publishers will be pitching their new titles as well as to present their complete catalogues, as opposed to other events dedicated to publishing within the context of Film Festivals that focus on a single book or volume. Producers will be offered a worldwide tour of publishing companies coming from all over the world. The uniqueness of this 3-day event consists not only in the organization of 1-to-1 meetings between the publishers and the producers, but also in enabling them to develop their network in a productive and welcoming setting. With the Book Adaptation Rights Market, the Venice Production Bridge renews its vocation to foster the development and production of international and European projects across a wide range of audiovisual forms. We warmly welcome you to this 6th edition and hope that it will bring many beneficial encounters.

COMPANY PROFILE

Actes Sud is an independent literary Publishing House established in Arles, Provence (South of France) since over 30 years. It was founded by Hubert Nyssen and his wife Christine Le Boeuf. They were soon joined by the three other founders, Françoise Nyssen, Bertrand Py and Jean-Paul Capitani.

With a strong emphasis on literary fiction, *Actes Sud* has established a solid reputation in publishing foreign fiction but also with a graphic identity (with a very specific format of the book, its choice of paper and its illustrated covers).

Over the years, Actes Sud has also spectacularly developed its French list, becoming a key player in French editorial landscape, managing to impose highly ambitious young writers such as Laurent Gaudé (Prix Goncourt 2004), Mathias Enard (Prix Décembre 2008, Prix du Livre Inter 2009, Prix Goncourt des Lycéens 2010) or Jérôme Ferrari (Prix Goncourt 2012) just to name a few. With about 500 titles a year (including French and Foreign literature, Fiction and Non-fiction, Theatre, Art and Photography books, children books, comics and graphic

Being first to publish Stieg Larsson's *Millenium* trilogy (more than 4 million copies sold) the *Actes Noirs* series has also made a name for itself, becoming quite a successful crime fiction trademark.

PAST MAIN PUBLICATIONS

Their Children after Them (Leurs enfants après eux) by Nicolas Mathieu (Prix Goncourt 2019). A portrait of teenagers growing up in a forgotten, hopeless region of France in the 1990s.

The Order of the day (L'Ordre du jour) by Éric Vuillard (Prix Goncourt 2017). 20 February 1933: on an unremarkable day at Berlin, a meeting of German captains of industry and senior Nazi dignitaries is being held. They are there to 'stump up' the funding for the accession to power of the National Socialist Party and its fearful Chancellor. 12 March 1938: the annexation of Austria is on the agenda and a grotesque day ensues which is intended to be gone down in history: the newsreels capture for eternity a motorised army, a terrible power and a modern version of fate being enacted. But behind Goebbels'

glorious propaganda, it is an Ersatz-Blitzkrieg which unfolds, the Panzers breaking down in mass on the roads of Austria; it is a world away from the concocted myth. The true behind-the-scenes story of the Anschluss reveals a very different, and less glorious, picture: no longer is it the resolve of character or the determination of a people which wins the day, but rather a combination of intimidation and bluff.

Compass (Boussole) by Mathias Énard (Prix Goncourt 2015). An immersive, nocturnal, musical novel, all generous erudition and bittersweet humour, Boussole is a journey and a declaration of admiration, a quest for the otherness inside us all and a hand reaching out – like a bridge between West and East, yesterday and tomorrow.

Before the Summer (Avant l'été) by Claudie Gallay (2021). A refreshing, joyous and fast-paced novel about metamorphosis and the promise of the future.

Full Ground (Pleine terre) by Corinne Royer (2021). A livestock farmer who has failed to fulfil his administrative obligations goes on the run like a common criminal with the gendarmes in hot pursuit.

Furies (5) by Julie Ruocco (2021). The adventures of a young archaeologist who has succumbed to the temptation of trafficking in antiquities and of a Syrian firefighter-turned-gravedigger as they contend with the harsh realities of war.

The Laws of Ascension (Les lois de l'ascension) by Céline Curiol (2021). 2015-2016. This novel unfolds over the course of one year and four seasons. In each season, it zooms in on a specific day in the lives of six men and women who all seem to a greater or lesser extent to have been dealt a bad hand in life, despite having followed their chosen paths. 5.000 copies sold, World Spanish Rights sold.

Sémi by Aki Shimazaki (2021). Tetsuo and Fujiko Niré have been living in an old people's home ever since Fujiko developed the first symptoms of Alzheimer's. They have lived a peaceful existence together. When she wakes up one morning, Fujiko no longer recognises her husband. More than 20 000 copies sold. World Spanish Rights sold.

Taming the River (La verticale du fleuve) by Clara Arnaud (2021). The environmental campaigner and Lenchua community member Suyapa is found murdered one morning on her farm. After Suyapa's murder, the movement opposing the construction of a hydroelectric plant on the Rio Lindo river fizzles out and a year later the trial of her alleged killers coincides with the beginning of works on the dam.

Woman of Skies and Storms (Femme du ciel et des tempêtes) (7) by Wilfried N'Sondé (2021). A Siberian Shaman discovers an African queen dating from over ten thousand years ago beneath the permafrost. Anxious to protect his land from the threat of gas operations, he contacts a French scientist friend who mounts a discreet expedition...

People Like Them (Des gens comme eux) by Samira Sedira (2020). Inspired by a true story, the novel explores the claustrophobia of a small isolated community where the outsider both fascinates and disturbs on account of his social status, his skin colour and his lust for life – until the final carnage. Rights sold in Germany and US.

A Single Rose (Une rose seule) (8) by Muriel Barbery (2020). Rose has just turned forty when she gets a call from a solicitor asking her to come to Kyoto for the reading of the will of her father, whom she never knew. And so for the first time in her life she flies to Japan. More than 70.000 copies sold. Rights sold in 23 countries.

NON-FICTION

Becoming an Oak Tree (Être un chêne) by Laurent Tillon (2021). What would trees tell us if we listened to them? To the author, the forest speaks and he listens.. Allying the naturalist sensibilities he developed in his teenage years to recent scientific discoveries, the author has, for the first time, been able to write a biography for this majestic tree in the prime of its life. More than 25.000 copies sold. Rights sold in Italy.

Ways of Being Alive (Manières d'être vivant) by Baptiste Morizot (2020). Building on his highly original work on the tracking of animals in their natural habitat, Baptiste Morizot argues that the time has come for us to jettison this nature/human dualism and re-think our relationships with other living beings. More than 45 000 copies sold. Rights sold: World English, Germany, Spain and Taiwan.



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
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

De Bezige Bij (The Busy Bee) is one of the leading literary publishers in the Netherlands for both Dutch and translated literature, fiction and non-fiction. During WWII, Geert Lubberhuizen gathered a group of students in the city of Utrecht and set up a small press. With their publications they financed their resistance movement.

De Bezige Bij was founded officially in December 1944. After the war had ended, the publisher established itself as an author's cooperative at the Van Miereveldstraat in Amsterdam. In these elegant premises – in 2021 refurbished to the sustainibility standards of today – the publishing house still resides and continues to go from strength to strength.

Nowadays *De Bezige Bij* publishes a wide range of Dutch fiction. In an impressive variety of literary styles, there is one common feature: quality. *De Bezige Bij* is also manifesting itself as publisher of non-fiction by leading Dutch and international authors. The main focus of this list has always been the Second World War and history in general, but the number of titles in other areas of non-fiction is increasing.

De Bezige Bij consists of the following lists: De Bezige Bij: upmarket fiction and non-fiction; Thomas Rap: upmarket fiction and non-fiction, books on comedy and sports; Cargo: crime fiction, thrillers, commercial fiction and non-fiction.

The Lightship (Het lichtschip) by Mathijs Deen (2020). Aboard a lightship is the cook, who prepares meals three times a day at fixed hours. Food offers consolation and stability in this isolated life. The day he wants to slaughter a young goat for a stew puts relationships on edge.

A partisan fighting with the Red Army in Germany comes across a grand, abandoned house, seemingly untouched by the devastation sweeping the country. Exhausted, he falls asleep but wakes to find a German patrol marching up the garden path. His only hope is to pose as the house's

Al Advancing Intelligence (Alsmaar Intelligenter) by Stefan Buijsman (2020). A young genius makes artifical intelligence understandable. Facial recognition, self-driving cars, algorithmic fake news. The promises and dangers of this technology dependentirely on us.

The Burgundians (De Bourgondiërs) (6) by Bart Van Loo (2019). Bart Van Loo brings the middle ages to life. It is an account of emerging cities, awakening individualism and dying knightly ideals, of schizophrenic kings, bold dukes and brilliant artists. A *Game of Thrones* of the Middle Ages.

Under the Knife (Onder het mes) (8) by Arnold van de Laar (2014). The entire history of surgery told in twenty-eight remarkable operations. The patients that feature: Empress Sissi (stabbed), Louis XIV (fistula in anus), Pope John Paul II (colostomy), John F. Kennedy and Lee Harvey Oswald (gunshot wounds), Lenin (cerebral infarction), Houdini (ruptured appendix), Albert Einstein (aneurysm) and Bob Marley (melanoma under toenail).



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

Siegfried Unseld, who joined Suhrkamp in 1952, became new head of the publishing house. Siegfried Unseld shaped the "Suhrkamp Culture" that is based on two forms of publications: on the one hand German and international literature of the 20th (e.g. Hermann Hesse, Bertolt Brecht, Max Frisch) and 21st century, on the other hand humanities (philosophy and sociology). 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

Tunué is among the leading publishing houses in Italy in its field, its catalogue boasts over 400 titles (45 books per year, 35 new and 10 reprints). Tunué publishes graphic novels, illustrated books, essays and novels. In the bookstore we are the third player for the graphic novel early and middle grade market with almost 10% of market share.

In 2018 Editrice II Castoro acquired the majority of Tunué's share capital. The partnership between Tunué and Editrice II Castoro draws on the respective editorial competences creating an innovation zone in the Italian and international graphic novel area.

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
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
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
