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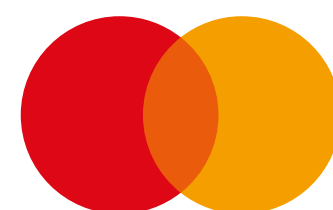

As the Book Adaptation Rights Market (BARM) enters its eleventh edition in 2026, it continues to strengthen its role as a leading international platform connecting the publishing, audiovisual and creative industries. Established within the Venice Production Bridge as part of the Venice International Film Festival, BARM was created with the aim of fostering dialogue and business opportunities between publishers, literary agents, producers and content creators interested in the adaptation and expansion of stories across multiple formats.

Over these years, BARM has welcomed more than 130 publishing houses and literary agencies from around 30 countries, facilitating hundreds of meetings and contributing to the development of numerous film and television projects. Throughout the years, the initiative has evolved alongside the market, embracing new forms of storytelling and encouraging collaborations that extend beyond traditional screen adaptations.

This year, BARM will host 30 selected publishers and literary agents from around the world, representing a diverse range of editorial catalogues and intellectual properties from thrillers to biographies, from romance to graphic novels, children's literature and much more.

The growing demand for premium intellectual properties across film, television, audio, podcasts and emerging AI-driven formats confirms the strategic importance of creating content ecosystems rather than single-format adaptations. Stories today increasingly move across platforms, reaching audiences through different channels and creating new opportunities for engagement, monetization and cultural impact.

For this reason, the 2026 edition of BARM will feature the panel: **Stories Across Platforms: Crossover Strategies Between Books, Audio and Film**. The discussion will explore how publishers, audio companies and content owners develop and manage their intellectual properties across multiple media. The panel will focus on strategies for identifying adaptation potential, building partnerships between publishing and audiovisual industries, expanding stories into audio and screen formats, and leveraging new technologies, including artificial intelligence, to enhance discoverability and audience reach.

As demonstrated by the growing presence of literary adaptations at major international festivals and on global streaming platforms, adaptations are no longer an exception but a central component of the contemporary content landscape. Yet the most successful projects increasingly emerge from a broader vision in which stories are conceived as intellectual properties capable of living across books, film, television, audio, podcasts and interactive experiences.

The success of literary adaptations has become increasingly evident across all major streaming platforms, further demonstrating the growing value of publishing as a source of premium audiovisual content. In 2025, Netflix reported that book-based adaptations generated more than 4.5 billion views globally and accounted for nearly 20% of all viewing hours on the platform, with adapted titles appearing in the Global Top 10 every week throughout the year. Among the most successful examples were *Frankenstein*, *The Thursday Murder Club*, *The Woman in Cabin 10*, *Ransom Canyon* and *The Hunting Wives*, confirming audiences' strong appetite for stories originating from books. At the same time, Prime Video continued to expand its adaptation strategy through projects based on bestselling novels and publishing phenomena, including titles such as *Love Me Love Me*, *We Were Liars*, *Cross*, *The House of the Spirits* and *Scarpetta*. The platform has also deepened its collaboration with bestselling author Mercedes Ron, adapting ten of her novels to date, including the *Culpables* trilogy (*My Fault*, *Your Fault* and *Our Fault: London*) and the *Enfrentados* series, reflecting a broader commitment to developing long-term literary franchises for young adult audiences across international markets. Disney+ likewise strengthened its investment in literary intellectual property with productions such as *The Stolen Girl* and the development of major publishing franchises including *Impossible Creatures*. Together, these projects illustrate how books have become one of the most reliable and sought-after sources of content for the global streaming industry, offering both proven audience engagement and rich opportunities for creative reinvention. Through networking, rights exchanges and industry discussions, the BARM continues to champion editorial quality, creative ambition and the enduring power of stories to travel across formats, languages and audiences.

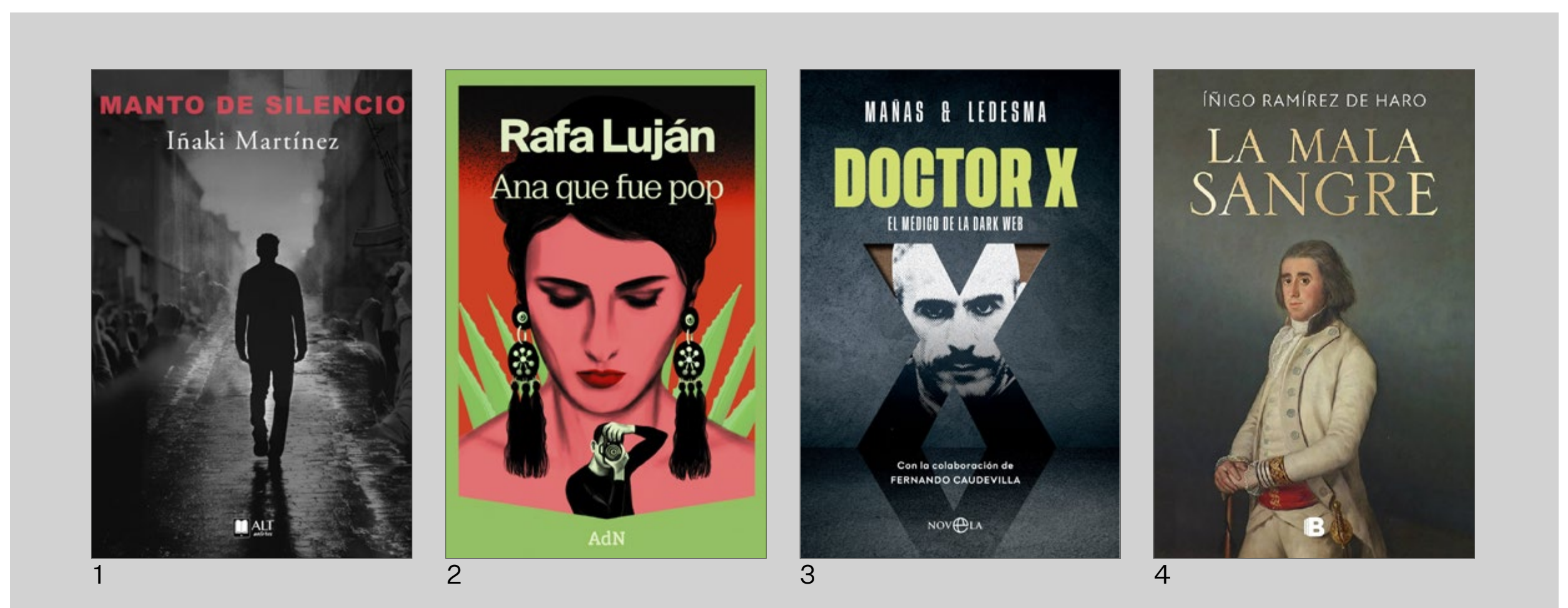

SPAIN

ALT AUTORES EDITORIAL

ALT Autores is a publishing house founded in 2017, dedicated to discovering new literary voices and working with award-winning writers. Its catalogue is distributed across print, digital, and audio formats, including audiobooks and podcasts. With a strong international focus, *ALT Autores* develops translation rights and audiovisual adaptations in collaboration with national and international producers. Led by Beatriz Celaya and Nuria Ostáriz, the audiovisual division specializes in book-to-screen development and rights representation. The projects have been selected for leading industry initiatives and markets, connecting literary IP with film, TV, streaming, documentary and animation producers.

PAST MAIN PUBLICATIONS



Cloth of Silence (Manto de silencio) (1) by Iñaki Martínez (*ALT Autores*, 2025). A political thriller inspired by the real disappearance of Basque activist Pertur during Spain's Transition years. Blending investigation, memory, and political conspiracy, the novel explores the hidden violence behind modern democracy. Highlights: strong adaptation potential as a prestige political thriller series; timely historical subject approaching the 50th anniversary of the events.

Amazona by Nuria Bueno (*ADN Anaya*, 2024). A psychological and emotional thriller centered on female identity, survival, and personal transformation. Through an intense and intimate narrative, the novel explores motherhood, fear, and empowerment. Highlights: option agreement renewed in 2025; strong female-led adaptation potential for film or streaming platforms.

Ana Who Was Pop (Ana que fue pop) (2) by Rafa G. Luján (*ADN Anaya*, 2024). A contemporary coming-of-age drama about fame, identity, and the emotional consequences of growing up under public attention. Through humour and emotional realism, the novel explores adolescence, music culture, and social pressure. Highlights: audiovisual rights sold in 2025; strong YA and streaming adaptation potential.

Doctor X (3) by José Ángel Mañas (*La Esfera de los Libros*, 2023). A provocative thriller blending medicine, media, and social controversy through the figure of a charismatic doctor navigating modern moral conflicts. Combining dark humour with social critique, the novel offers strong potential for an edgy contemporary TV adaptation. Highlights: audiovisual rights sold in 2025; written by bestselling author José Ángel Mañas, author of *Historias del Kronen*.

Sullied Blood (La mala sangre) (4) by Ignacio Ramírez de Haro (*Ediciones B*, 2022). A dark family thriller about power, corruption, and inherited violence within the Spanish elite. With sharp dialogue and psychological tension, the novel dissects privilege and moral decay across generations. Highlights: audiovisual rights sold in 2025; strong potential for prestige television drama.

Death at the Carlton (Muerte en el Carlton) by Javier Sagastiberry (*Erein*, 2021). A crime thriller set in Bilbao where a murder investigation uncovers political secrets and hidden tensions beneath the city's elegant surface. Atmospheric and cinematic, the novel combines noir investigation with strong local identity. Highlights: option agreement renewed in 2025; ideal for crime series adaptation.

FICTION

How to Write a Novel About Your Pathetic and Sad Life (Cómo escribir una novela de tu patética vida) (5) by Lorena Amkie (SM, 2026). A coming-of-age dramedy centered on a young woman navigating grief, anxiety, creativity, and identity while attempting to turn her chaotic personal life into fiction. With sharp humour and emotional honesty, the novel speaks directly to Gen Z and young adult audiences. Highlights: written by bestselling YA author Lorena Amkie, whose previous works have sold more than 20,000 copies and built a strong online community; strong adaptation potential for streaming platforms targeting young audiences.

Lucky! by Beatriz Osés (2026). A feel-good family dramedy following emotionally fractured characters who rediscover hope, love, and second chances through an unexpected journey. Combining humour, emotional depth, and intergenerational conflict, the novel has strong commercial potential for both film and streaming audiences seeking uplifting yet sophisticated stories. Highlights: written by award-winning Spanish author Beatriz Osés, one of the most recognized voices in contemporary children's and YA literature in Spain; strong female-led ensemble and clear adaptation potential for feature film or limited series.

Transition: The U-Feeling Experience IV (Transición. La experiencia U-Feeling IV) (6) by Eva G. Guerrero & José Ángel Mañas (2026). A dystopian sci-fi thriller set in a near-future Spain where body-swapping technology has become legal, exposing a world of political corruption, corporate control, and violence hidden beneath apparent social progress. Highlights: fourth installment of the acclaimed U-Feeling saga, already translated into English, German, Swedish, and Ukrainian, with French and Italian editions forthcoming; strong adaptation potential as a high-concept TV series in the vein of Black Mirror.

The Sanatorium of Provenza (El sanatorio de la Provenza) (7) by Rosa Blasco (2025). A psychological thriller set inside an isolated sanatorium where buried traumas, manipulation, and obsession slowly emerge. Atmospheric and

emotionally intense, the novel combines psychological suspense with gothic undertones. Highlights: strong female-centered thriller with contained locations and elevated visual style, making it highly adaptable for limited series or feature film. Sold more than 10,000 copies.

The Cross of El Dorado (La cruz del Dorado) by César Mallorquí (2006). An adventure thriller blending historical mystery, action, and treasure-hunt storytelling across Latin America and Europe. The story follows a dangerous search linked to the legend of El Dorado and hidden historical secrets. Highlights: winner of the Premio Edebé; more than 115,000 copies sold; continuously reprinted and sold almost twenty years after publication; ideal for international adventure film or series adaptation in the tradition of Indiana Jones or National Treasure.

NON-FICTION

Nocturnos (8) by Javier Pérez Campos (Grupo Planeta, 2025). A true-crime and paranormal nonfiction project exploring serial killers, disappearances, unexplained events, and psychological darkness through interconnected nighttime narratives. Built from years of investigation and real documented cases, it creates an immersive and unsettling universe about fear and human behaviour. Highlights: published by Planeta; strong anthology-series potential in the vein of True Detective and Black Mirror; author is a well-known journalist and collaborator on Spanish television programme Cuarto Milenio.

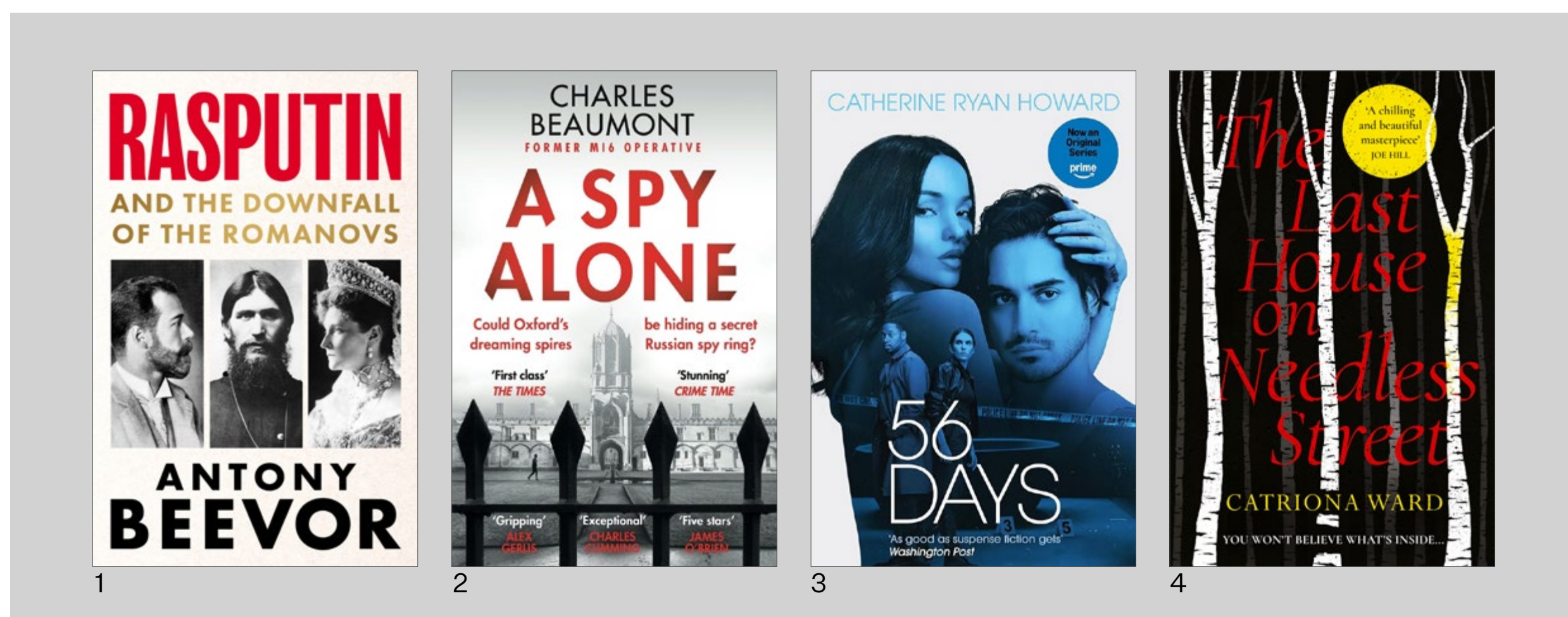
Stories of Psychedelic Science (Historias de ciencia psicodélica) by Alejandra Ortiz Medrano (2025). A documentary-style nonfiction work exploring the history, science, and human stories surrounding psychedelic research and consciousness studies. Combining scientific dissemination with personal testimonies and cultural analysis, the project offers strong international documentary adaptation potential. Highlights: conceived as an audio documentary experience with clear crossover possibilities into documentary film and serialized streaming content.

The Last House On Needless Street (4) by Catriona Ward (2021). This is the story of a serial killer. A stolen child. Revenge. Death. And an ordinary house at the end of an ordinary street. Bestselling Richard & Judy Book Club Pick. Under option.

Almost by Georgia Pactat (2027). *Almost* is a profoundly moving, elevated love story that uses just a touch of magical realism to explore the complex subjects of gender and identity. For fans of Gabrielle Zavin’s *Tomorrow and Tomorrow and Tomorrow* with gorgeous, tender writing, an original premise and heart-breaking denouement.

After Darcy (5) by Joanna Nadin (2026). A “riotously funny and thoroughly contemporary” take on the Bennet sisters 20 years after Darcy and Bingley have been killed, from the award-winning author of many books for children and adults, including an adaptation of *Sense and Sensibility* for children.

Boy Friends (6) by Kai Spellmeier (2026). For fans of Alice Oseman and Sophie Gonzales, *Boy Friends* is a contemporary YA romance set against the backdrop of a cosy seaside town, following two best friends after an anonymous announcement declaring that they are in love appears on the town noticeboard. A swoon-worthy story about friendship, courage and the kind of love that changes everything.

Buyer Beware (7) by Catherine Ryan Howard (2026). From the internationally bestselling author of *56 Days*, a page-turning thriller about two women whose shattered lives come crashing together around a house whose secrets could bury them both. A puzzle box of a thriller full of mind-boggling twists and turns, *Buyer Beware* is a chilling exploration of the dark secrets that any house can hold—and of the lengths we’ll go to start over.

Smallie (8) by Eden McKenzie-Goddard (2026). The “immersive and spirited” debut novel *Smallie* is an exhilarating and expansive tale of a family thrown into collision with the Windrush scandal. *Smallie* shows just how easily the past can spill into our lives, even when – especially when – we think we’ve closed the door on it.

Stay Buried by Jane R. Miles (2026). *Christmas Eve, 1974*: As Cyclone Tracy tears through Darwin, four girls disappear into the heart of the outback. No tracks. No bodies. No answers. Decades later, one returns. Inspired by true events, *Stay Buried* is the darkly thrilling tale of secrets unearthed, the will to survive and a legend that refuses to die.

The Fallout by Eleanor Anstruther (2026). It is December 1982, and the personal is about to become political for unsuspecting 15-year-old Bridget as she skips school to join the women gathering at the Greenham Common nuclear base outside London in this funny and moving coming-of-age story about an unlikely group of women whose actions changed the world, and a family hiding a secret that can only lead to fallout.

The One by Isabella Galbraith (2026). *The Bachelor* meets *Five Survive*; a reality TV-themed thriller following 18-year-old Constance Berardi who signs up for a teen dating show to get over her ex, only to end up stranded on an island with the other contestants, a dead girl — and a murderer. As supplies dwindle and tensions rise amongst the group, Constance must discover the truth...or die trying.

BAO PUBLISHING

Founded in 2009 by Caterina Marietti and Michele Foschini, *BAO Publishing* is one of Italy's leading graphic novel publishers. With 45 new releases per year, 20 of which are originals, the company has spearheaded the renaissance of comics in Italian bookstores, changing the perception of the comics language in the Italian cultural landscape. Heralded by the staggering success of *Zerocalcare* (over three million copies sold in Italy alone since 2012), *BAO's* Foreign Rights department has sold its OGNs in over twenty markets. The current roster of creators sees the highest ever presence of female voices, a fact that *BAO* is especially proud of.

Every Time I Grew Up (Tutte le volte che sono diventato grande) (1) by Giulio Macaione (2025).

Giulio Macaione, after the success of *Scirocco*, tackles an (almost) autobiographical story about the years that led him to be who he is now. In a 1990s Palermo, Sicily, Lucio finds himself having much more responsibility than any of his friends: his mother on the verge of a nervous breakdown treats him like an adult, and meanwhile the world around him leads him to think about himself, his sexuality and the things he really wants to do. In a tale spanning an entire adolescence, Lucio finds himself putting the pieces of his life together alone while around him his family collapses. While all he wants to do is stay locked in his bedroom drawing *Sailor Moon*! A sincere story, drawn in a style that is a perfect bridge between the Italian comics scene and manga. 5,000 copies sold so far. Rights sold in Spain.

Comet Club (2) by Yi Yang (2024). *Comet Club* is a coming of age story in a high school, populated by characters who are as keen to look within themselves as they are to stargaze, looking at the sky. Yang Kuaikuai faces the return of his mother, who abandoned him when he was 4 years old and now offers him a new adventure in the metropolis. Li Yu, on the other hand, is trying to figure out how to leave behind the mediocrity of their small mountain village and joins the Comet Club, hoping that the sighting of a UFO could change his life. The two boys, already protagonists of Yang's previous comics, face different challenges, but ones that can only be resolved in a similar way: by deciding who they want to be when they grow up. Yang's characters are recurring, and have already starred in

two other GNs, but each story is independent, and the cast is reintroduced every time, making for a rich backstory, but accessible narrative. 4,000 copies sold so far. Rights sold in Spain, US and France.

Forget My Name (Dimentica il mio nome) (3) by Zerocalcare (2014). Shortlisted for the 2015 Strega Award, this classic by Zerocalcare deals with the adventurous truths about his grandmother's life that the protagonist learns after her death. A rumination on loss, family and the obsession for control of modern-day society. Arguably Zerocalcare's most beloved book. 15,000 copies sold so far. Rights sold to Bosnia Erzegovina, Germany, France, Spain, Croatia, USA, Slovenia and Brazil.

Delivery Night (Una notte da rider) (4) by Arlen (2025). Winner of the Best Debut award at Napoli Comicon 2026, this is the story of the delivery boy from an ethnic restaurant who delivers the wrong package at the wrong address. The very mundane mistake would have no consequences, if the package didn't contain a kind of shrimp that gives super strength to anyone who eats it, and if the delivery wasn't intended for a criminal cartel that needed the shrimp to pull off a heist. Tinged with social satire about the gig economy and the condition of irregular workers, this urban, contemporary, fast-paced story has been considered by many an outstanding debut from creator Arlen, a very personal voice in modern Italian comics.



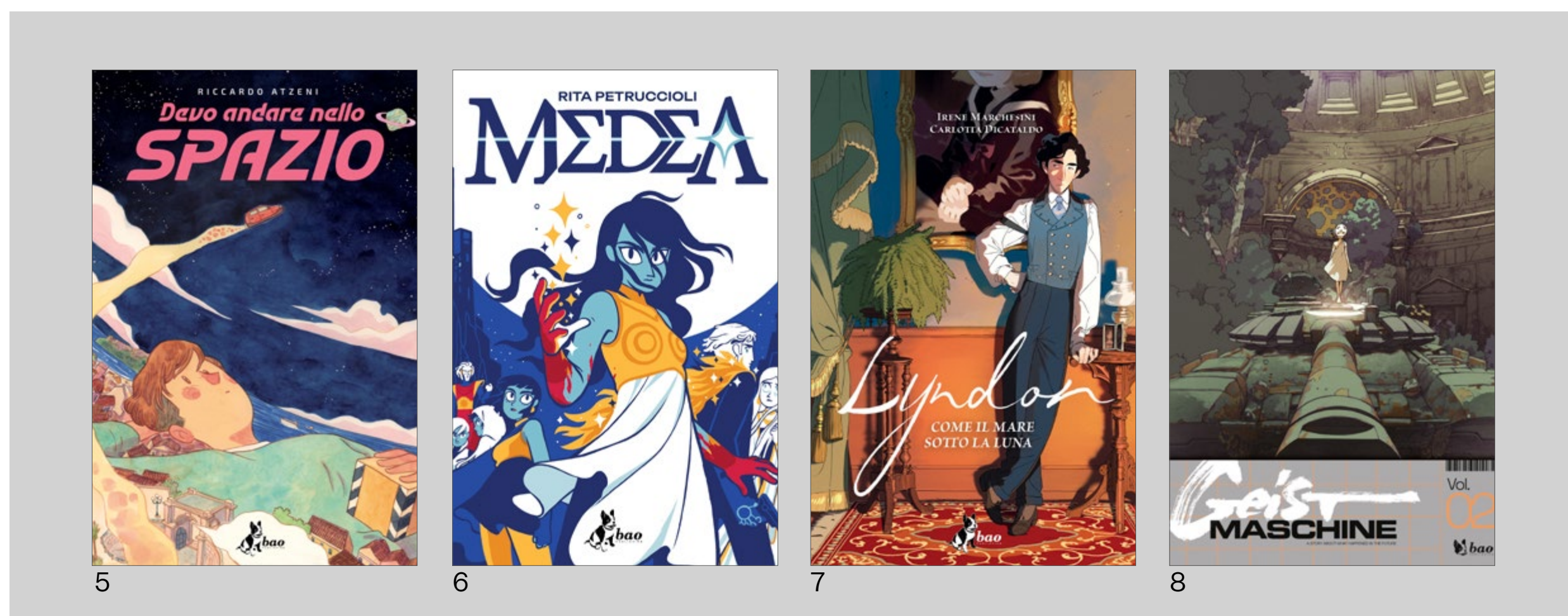

I Must Go To Space (Devo andare nello spazio) (5) by Riccardo Atzeni (2026). Mocci is a victim of the gig economy. Every day he gets launched into space with his compact car to go retrieve what people have misplaced and want back: from text files to old trinkets, to dick pics: if it's out there, Mocci can get it back... for a price. But Mocci's father is sick, and for reasons he does not want to think about, he doesn't want to visit him in the hospital. His excuse? "I must go to space!" One day, though, his father vanishes. He officially becomes a missing person, which means he must be in space. So Mocci is the only member of the family equipped to go look for him, even if it means confronting his demons. Despite a gonzo premise, the urban, contemporary story is a tale of broken relationships and hearts that need to mend.

Medea (Medea) (6) by Rita Petruccioli (2026). What if the myth of Medea was not set in two city-states, but on two planets? What if the differences between Jason's people and Medea's was so visually striking that it embodies the concept of racism itself? And what if Medea had not killed her children after all? Rita Petruccioli reworks one of the most well-known and beloved myths and makes it socially and politically relevant for our age. The light sci-fi setting offsets the ancient allure of the characters, and this story of love, affirmation, betrayal and identity is fresh and powerful again, thanks to a master storyteller on top of her narrative game.

Lyndon – Like The Sea Under The Moon (Lyndon – Come il mare sotto la luna) (7) by Irene Marchesini and Carlotta Dicataldo (2025). Lyndon Meriwhether is a primary school teacher haunted by nightmares. The year is 1898 and he quits his teaching job in London to go teach on a remote island off the coast of Scotland. He hopes to escape his fears and his constant feeling of anxiety, but he will be disappointed. One day, one of his pupils vanishes, and no one seems to care, except for the boy's older brother. It will be up to him and Lyndon to find the boy, and Lyndon will wrestle free of his apathy and depression in the process. A story about the need to decide to take care of ourselves, cleverly set in a time ancient enough to be lacking the reassurance of psychoanalysis, but close enough to resemble our world, our society. A YA-crossover story with a hint of gay romance that is proving immensely popular with readers worldwide.

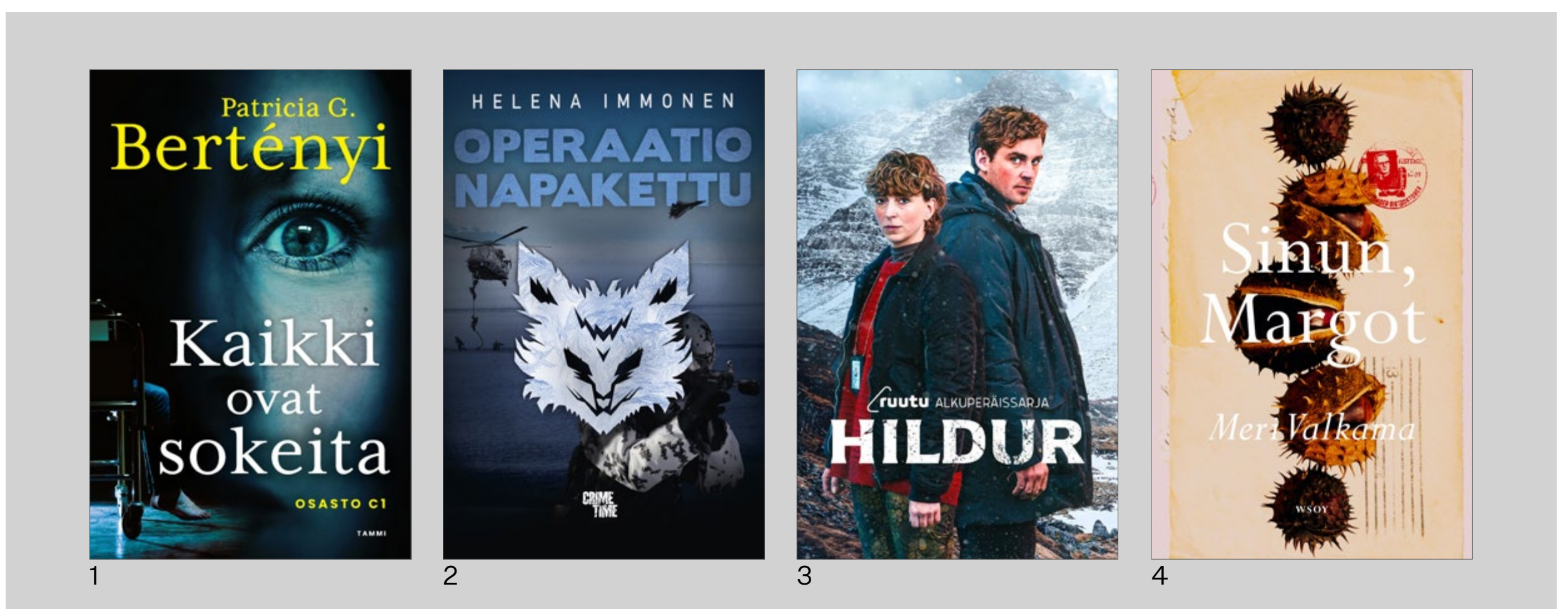
Geist Maschine trilogy (Geist Maschine) (8) by LRNZ (2021-2026) Imagine a modern version of Future Boy Conan set among the ruins of Rome. A planetary plague has decimated humankind, and the most visible remnants of the civilization that is lost and almost forgotten are the shells of its giant weapons, that clearly have not been able to save it from destruction. Two children, Sol and Len, orphans, meet a solitary teen, Aidan, and embark on a quest to find a legendary lost city that may contain the key to the survival of the human species. Naturalistic in its approach, told from the point of view of children, casting a fresh look on familiar environments, quite like the *A Quiet Place* movie series, Geist Maschine is an almost one thousand page graphic novel split in three volumes, chronicling the resilience and endurance of humans in the face of extinction-level adversity. Truly a masterpiece, by one of the most acclaimed creators of his generation.

FINLAND

BONNIER RIGHTS FINLAND

Bonnier Rights Finland is a literary agency representing a curated list of translation rights to high-quality adult fiction, children's books, young adult titles, as well as illustrated and narrative non-fiction from Finland. The agency has been in operation since 2007. Its authors and illustrators are primarily — though not exclusively — published by *WSOY*, *Tammi*, *Bazar*, *Johnny Kniga*, *Kosmos*, *Readme*, *Docendo* and *CrimeTime*, all imprints of *Werner Söderström Ltd* in Helsinki, part of the international *Bonnier Books* publishing group. The agency also represents film and TV rights directly on behalf of selected authors. Most recently, the *Nordic Blue Hildur* series, based on Satu Rämö's bestselling books, launched and garnered over 1 million views within its first week.

PAST MAIN PUBLICATIONS



Department C1 (Osasto C1) (1) by Patricia G. Bertényi (2024): A gripping hospital thriller with a social conscience. Janka has been a hospital cleaner for over twenty years. She knows more than her humble job suggests: in a previous life, she was the chief medical examiner in her home country. Domestic book sales exceed 22,000 copies. Estonian and Polish rights sold.

Operation Arctic Fox (Operaatio Napakettu) (2) by Helena Immonen (2023): Action thriller series combining military drama, espionage, and geopolitical intrigue in the icy frontier of the Arctic. The book has been a No. 1 bestseller in Finland and sales in the series exceed 200,000 copies. A TV series is in development (*ICS Nordic*), with creator Brendan Foley (*Sherlock & Daughter*) attached.

Hildur (Hildur) (3) by Satu Rämö (2022) 'Nordic Blue' crime drama, based on the bestselling & prize-winning series. A surfing female detective fights against time to confront a serial killer in the fjords of Iceland while unraveling the mystery of her long-lost sisters. Translated into 29 languages. Sales exceed 1.5 million copies worldwide. The TV series launched in January '26 to over 1 million views within its first week.

Yours, Margot (Sinun, Margot) (4) by Meri Valkama (2021): In the '80s, Vilja grows up in East Berlin, where her father works as a foreign correspondent. Decades later, she discovers letters revealing a secret love affair and returns to uncover the truth—only to find her memories fading and her past unraveling. Domestic sales exceed 83,000 copies. Best Debut of the Year 2021. Translated into 8 languages. Juho Kuosmanen (Grand Prix at Cannes) attached as director. Seriesmakers Beta Development Award.

Arctic Hustle (Arktis 1. Turisti) (5) by Noora Mustajoki & Bosse Hellsten (2026). *Arctic Hustle* is a sharp, plot-dense and Coen-esque new series featuring unforgettable characters and deadpan twists — set against a backdrop as breathtaking as it is unforgiving. Packed with brilliantly quirky characters and deadpan humor, the book makes you root even for the pettiest players. Violence and comedy collide, creating a world where a botched plan unravels spectacularly — and hilariously. Estonian and Latvian rights sold. 6,000 copies sold domestically.

Champagne & Chaos (Säädytön) (6) by Henrika de Kermadec (2025). An Unlikely Love Story — A Real Life Fairy-Tale. What happens when a queer bohemian Finn who rejects fairy-tale romance gets stuck in a French château — and falls in love with an aristocrat? *Champagne & Chaos* is autofiction, based on real life events. Estonian rights sold. 5,500 copies sold domestically.

Esther, the Butcher (Ester, teurastaja) (7) by Mariia Niskavaara (2025). The breakout title of the London Book Fair 2026 with rights sold into 30 territories within weeks. This debut is a masterclass in rhythm, language, and grotesque beauty. Niskavaara’s laconic style evokes Kafka, but with a distinctly Finnish, Kaurismäki-esque deadpan style. Her voice is fiercely original. By focusing on the female body and carving out a woman’s coming-of-age story, she is taking grotesque to dazzling new heights.

HAVU (Havu) by Helena Immonen (2025). Two lonely misfits meet in a park and strike up a friendship, discovering they are soul mates despite a forty-year age gap. A cautionary tale against making snap judgements based on appearances.

Mad love (Amor Fou) (8) by Marta Sanz (2018). A claustrophobic, cinematic tale on the degenerative aspects of love, obsession and the dark side of the human soul. Told from two perspectives, Adrien and Lela's lives are disrupted when her ex, Raymond moves in across the street and spies on them. He hooks up with Adrian's ex. Leyla's relationship with him was immature but full of sexual chemistry, with Adrian, it's mature. A tense Hitchcockian/Highsmith like drama that escalates into accusations which may or may not be true.

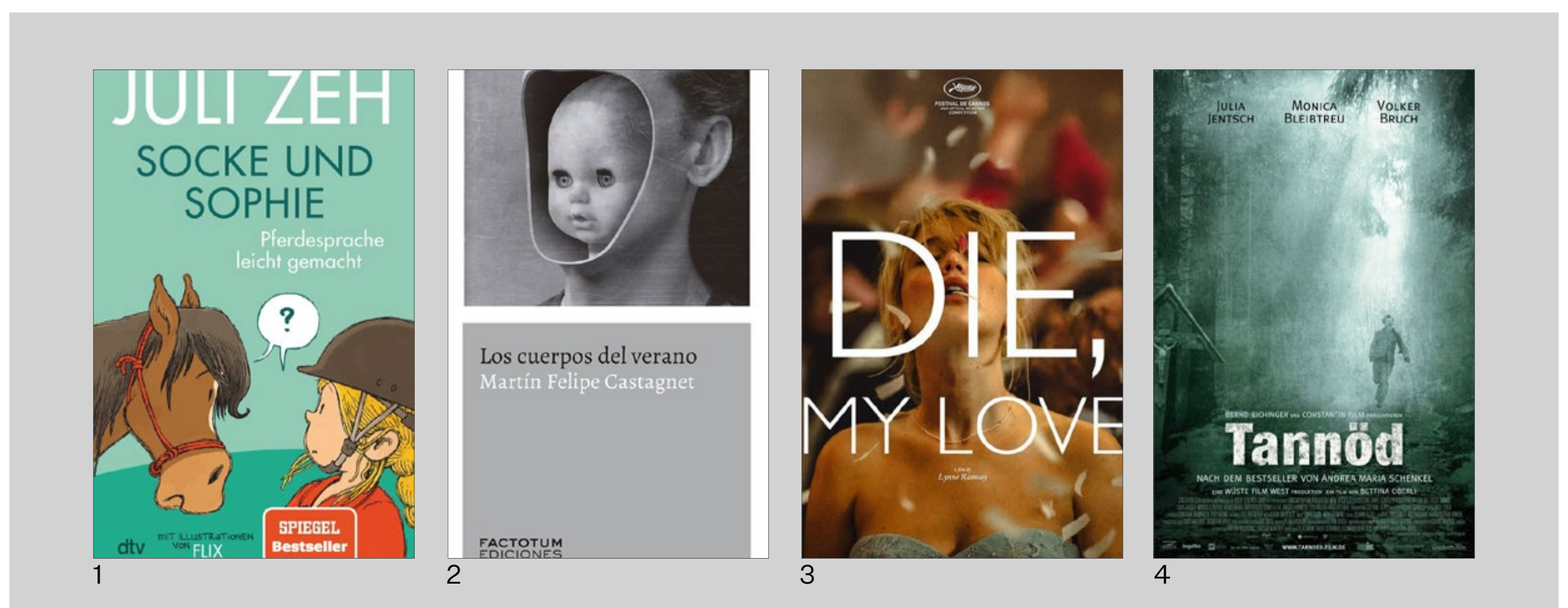

A tale about our bodies failing, menopause, female desire, the tyranny and misogyny of the medical establishment. A thoughtful, witty, self-deprecating meditation on hypochondria and aging. Bodies of Summer (Los Cuerpos del Verano) (2) by Martín Castagnet (2012). The existence of an afterlife is now a fact — on the internet. Death is merely an interruption, as souls can be uploaded to the web and downloaded into new bodies in the physical world. But how can one seek revenge when death itself becomes an opportunity for an upgrade? The film will be set in Palestine and produced by Incognito Films (France), O Som e a Fúria (Portugal) and One Two Films (Germany).

Glaxo (3) by Hernán Ronsino (2009) In a derelict town in Argentina’s pampas, a decades-old betrayal simmers among a group of friends, who grow up breaking-in houses and idolizing John Wayne, only to become adults embroiled in illicit romances, government death squads, and, ultimately, murder. Translated into 6 languages. Benjamín Naishtat’s adaptation is forthcoming with RT Features and Rei Pictures and stars Argentine actor and singer Lali Espósito.

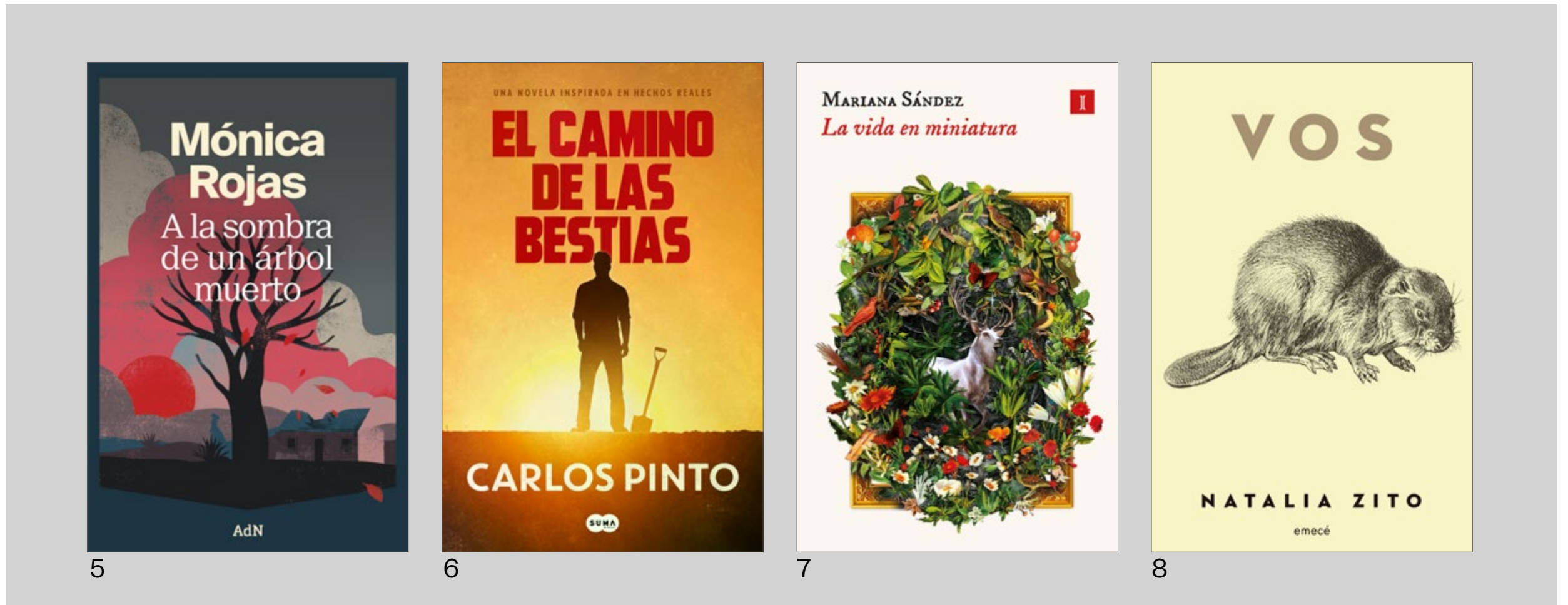

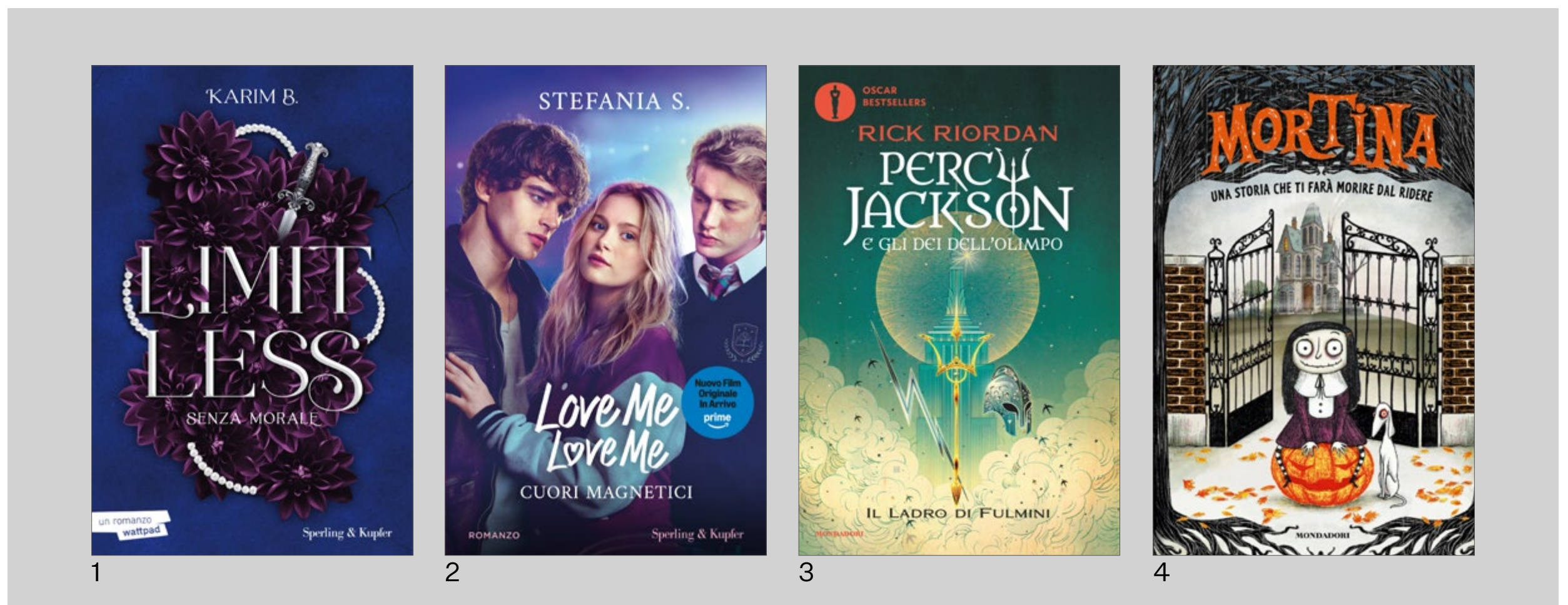

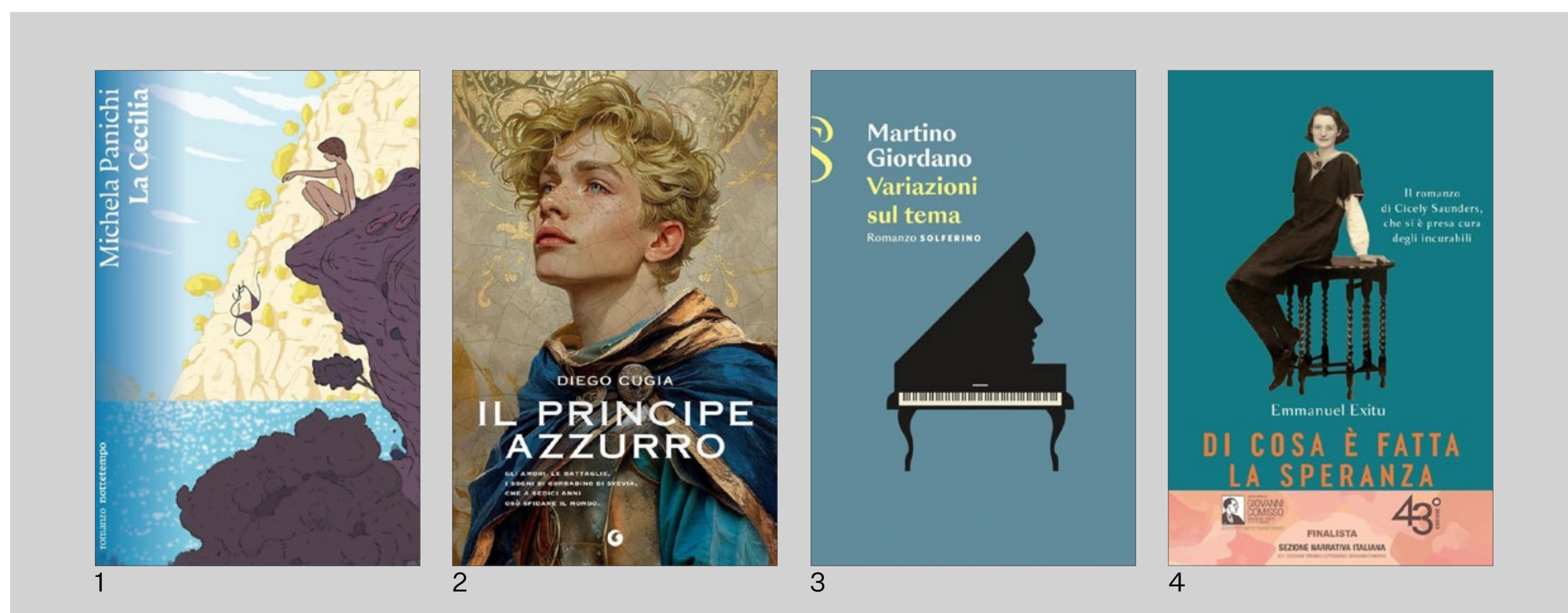

What Became of Snow? The Caramazo Brothers (I Fratelli Caramazo) by Valentino Ronchi (2026). The Caramazo Brothers is a vibrant coming of age story set in working class Milan in the early 1980s, where football, family, and adolescence collide with humor and tenderness. Through the eyes of thirteen year old Giomita, we follow the chaotic lives of the Caramazo brothers: Aldo, a poetic teenage football prodigy chasing love and glory with the underdog team Virtus Niguarda, and Omar, the youngest brother with Down syndrome, whose innocence becomes the family’s emotional center. As the neighborhood rallies around Virtus’s improbable championship run, the brothers navigate first desires, economic hardship, grief, friendship, and the fragile dignity of suburban life. Blending raw comedy with emotional depth, the novel turns lower league football into an epic backdrop for growing up.

Family Bestiary (Bestiario Familiare) (6) by Lilith Moscon (2022). Bestiario familiare tells the story of Lilith’s childhood between Florence and a small village in Veneto, within a chaotic, loving, and eccentric family filled with animals, unusual relatives, and unforgettable characters. At the center of her world is her magnetic older brother Gorkij, whose overwhelming presence often makes Lilith feel invisible and pushes her to search for her own voice. Through grief, separations, fears, and everyday moments, she gradually grows up and discovers writing as a way to make sense of memory, family, and identity. A coming of age novel with a fairy tale atmosphere, blending irony, tenderness, and melancholy.

Little Big Uruguay (Piccolo Grande Uruguay) (7) by Alicia Baladan (2011). Set during Uruguay’s military dictatorship, the story follows Alicia, a sensitive and imaginative girl growing up between political repression, family absence, and childhood wonder. After her father is arrested as a “subversive,” her life unfolds through prison visits, hidden fugitives, and a Montevideo suspended between fear and everyday tenderness. Through music, eccentric friendships, and small acts of imagination, Alicia learns to transform trauma into memory and resilience. Blending political history with the gaze of a child, the novel explores how wonder, humor, and human connection can survive even under oppression.

White Rabbits (Conigli Bianchi) (8) by Margherita Emo (2011). Born into a fading aristocratic family in the Venetian countryside, Margherita grows up in a vast villa suspended between past grandeur and quiet decay. Through the eyes of a sensitive and imaginative girl, the story explores childhood fears, family rituals, first desires, and the fragile mythology of home, shared with her charismatic sister Cate and an eccentric household of relatives and servants. When her father launches an ambitious cultural festival in the early 1990s, the villa briefly comes alive with artists, music, and dreams of reinvention — until financial collapse, betrayal, and loss force the family to abandon the place forever. Years later, Margherita still carries the emotional shipwreck of that vanished world, searching for a way to rebuild a sense of belonging after the end of childhood.

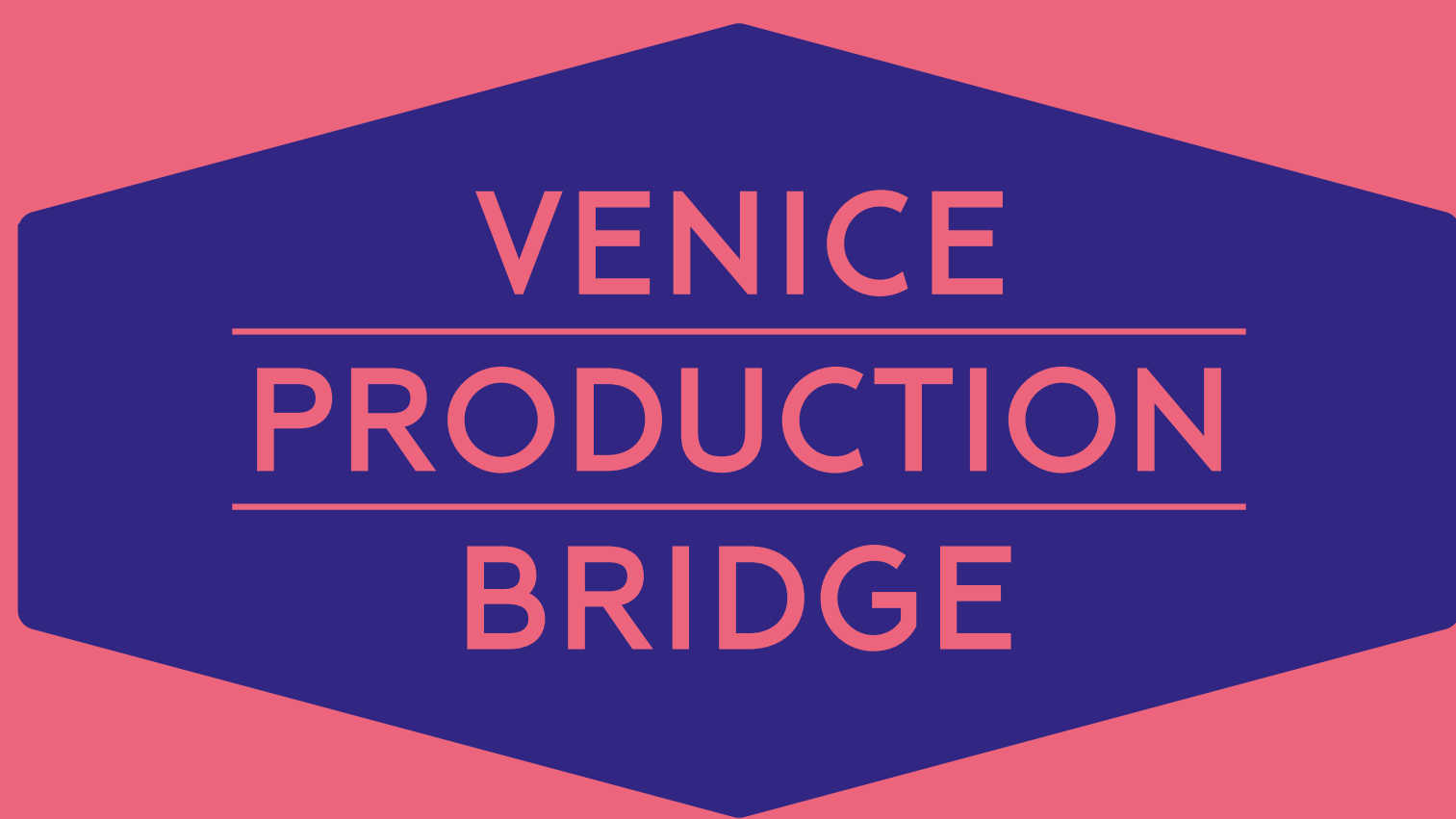
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
